It has been a busy term this year for green schools. Our Green Schools Committee along with the TY group have taken part in a number of environmental actions.

Dara Dever from An Taisce came and spoke to TY's about how to change a tyre. This was to promote cycling to



school and reduce using cars. TYs had great fun finding the puncture and repairing it! We would like to thank Mr. Dever for an excellent workshop.

We are currently selling our aluminum water bottles at a cost of €3 per student. We have installed a water station in the lunch room for students to use. The

reason for this Is that we want to reduce plastic water bottles reusable aluminum with bottles. They are great quality and should last the school year. I would like to thank Ellie Rose Mannion and Chloe Reddan for speaking at the assemblies and selling the reusable bottles.



We are applying this year for

our fifth Green Schools Flag for biodiversity. We have created a wildflower garden in our school lawn. Our first years and Green Schools Committee have planted crocuses, hyacinths, snowdrops, daffodils and heathers. These plants appear in March and the lawn will look lovely then. We hope to have our wildlife lawn featured in the Wildlife section of the Limerick leader then.

We have entered the Young Environmental Awards with two entries. One entry will deal with the environmental impact of disposable wipes and the second is biodiversity and our school wildflower lawn.

In order to learn about planting and biodiversity, we had a visit from Albert Nolan who is an expert in this area. He told us the importance of wildlife areas for pollinators such as bees. Our bee species is in decline due to wildlife areas being cut down for buildings and roads and insecticides and pesticides being used in fields. These chemicals kill the plants that bees and butterflies need. The advice he gave us is to leave part of your lawn wild so that native bees and insects can live and pollinate in these areas. We would like to thank Mr. Nolan for coming to speak to us and advise us on planting.



WildLife Expert's Tips

Why do we need pollinators? We need them to make food. 75% of what we eat is pollinated by bees. Without bees we would not be able to eat our favourite foods like bread, pasta and cereal.

To avoid being stung, leave the bees alone. Bumble bees give 3 warnings that you are upsetting them. Firstly they lift one leg. Next they lift 2 legs and thirdly they roll on their belly. After that they will sting.

Worker bees live six weeks. They gather nectar and pollen. The bee will visit 10,000 to 20,000 flowers. What can help a tired bee is leaving a tissue soaked in sugary water. Male bees only appear in late summer.

To create a wildlife area, you need plenty of flowers. In our school lawn we need lots of flowers that will bloom in Spring time such as Crocus, Snowdrop, Hyacinths. When planting bulbs, you put 2/3 of them in pots at dig down far enough (2 times the height of the bulb).

Frank O Connor, Mrs. Carmel Plant Diocesan Advisor, Sr. Colette Hourigan, Sr. Angela Leahy and Sr. Ann Hurley (Presentation Sisters, presently associated with our secondary school) management, staff and present students of the school.



Ms. O'Brien, (Religious Education) Department in collaboration with all Religious Education Classes in the school studied the life and works of Nano Nagle and prepared a very elaborative Liturgy. Every class was given a role and responsibility to ensure that our celebration was a day to remember. Our students embodied the life and spirit of Nano Nagle and decorated the whole school with words, images and

creativity in Nano Nagle's memory.



The readings recalled Nano's life and works. Symbols that were used to illustrate the life of Nano Nagle included: The Icon of Nano Nagle by Desmond Kyne, A Bible to remind us of her great devotion and prayer life each night, A Lantern which was the light that guided her though the streets of Cork visiting the sick, poor and lonely each night, A Relic of Nano Nagle. Bishop Brendan in his homily reminded us that Nano Nagle's conversion from life of luxury of Paris to when she was led by the Holy Spirit to the poor of Cork City.

TY Students performed a Liturgical movement to the beautiful St. Teresa's Prayer reminding us that Christ has no body on earth but ours. This prayer had a profound effect on all of us present as we meditated, while the girls moved in graceful and reverent motions.



The Handing on the Flame of Nano Nagle was a pivotal part of our celebration. Sr. Colette Hourigan P.B.V.M spoke about highly educated lay men and women continue this wonderful work which began in South Presentation Convent in Cork City and that flame spread not only around Ireland but also to the Five continents around the world. Sr. Colette spoke about the wonderful contribution that was made by Presentation Sisters in Limerick City since 1837. Appreciating everyone's role in the school community, the role of the Spiritual Lay Leaders is the future of Spiritual and Human Growth for our youth. Sr. Colette called on Ms. O'Brien who has wide Spiritual Experiences of leading our students in moments of quiet prayer but also praying as a whole school community to opening their eyes to wider world and developing them to be Just and Responsible people. <u>Sci Fest Success</u>

On the 14th of December a number of our TY students travelled to the Digital Hub in Dublin to compete in this year's Teen Turn Scifest event. The girls had huge success in the competition coming home with three prizes including first and second place for Tracka and Eco Case. This was a huge achievement. Five projects were entered into the competition:



1. Cookies for Rookies

"A cookie is a small text file created by a website that is stored in the user's computer either temporarily or permanently. Cookies provide a way for the website to recognize you and keep track of your preferences."

The main objective of this project is to raise awareness and to educate the public about cookies and what they're consenting to as they browse the internet. Through the years, we have discovered arising notices apprising us to agree to cookies and their privacy policy, but do we fully acknowledge the consequences of consenting to cookies? We have gathered data from internet users using surveys to get a better understanding weather or not internet users understand what cookies really are. We will then produce an animation providing information on different types of cookies and what their purpose is to help educate our school community.

2. Planet Project

An app aimed at young teens, helping to teach them about the environment, it includes topics such as global warming, pollution and the extinction of bees.

It has an easy to understand interface, making it simple to pick up and use.

3. Dark Patterns

A dark pattern is a user interface formed to trick online users into doing things they wouldn't generally do. The goal of our project is to spread awareness and hopefully make internet users more conscious of dark patterns. We have designed an app which will scan certain applications on an internet user's phone and detect whether the apps contain dark patterns.

4. Eco Case

The aim of our project was to create the "perfect" case for a phone. A case that will be able to self-cool, solar charge, keep headphones untangled and most importantly keep your phone protected. We plan to keep our case as locally manufactured as possible. We approached FabLabs Limerick with our concept and asked if they could appraise our design and make it for us. They modified and adjusted certain areas in our design and suggested that the best possible material we could use was Polyurethane so we tried it out and it was a success.

5. Tracka

Each Student that registers will get their own private account that only the student and their teacher will have access to. The students input their results of each class test into the app and it will automatically start to generate a tracking graph. Students will clearly see through visual graphics how they are progressing throughout the academic year. Our app will also be a useful toll at parent teacher meetings to help parents to understand where their child may be struggling and to help to improve their child to progress in their learning.
